- You can put a reserve price on the plant if you wish by putting the word 'Reserve' and the reserve price on the label. If the bidding doesn't reach the reserve you take your plant home.
- A coloured sticker will be placed on the plant to indicate it has a reserve price.
- Have a list of your orchids ready to give the auctioneer and mark those with a reserve clearly with the reserve price. You may wish to include brief relevant information on the list such as e.g. 'This orchid needs a dry rest in winter', or similar cultural requirements to assist newer members.
- The Society takes a 10% commission on sales.
 Purchases will be <u>cash only</u> on the night. It will help if you have smaller denominations.
- All plants offered for sale must be disease and pest free, in a good healthy condition and have been reported for at least 3 months.
- There will be no orchid sales on the sales table on auction night.

THUNIA VENOSA PLANTS At our 2019 October meeting Graham Larkham showed us how to cut the canes up, spray the ends with Steriprune and then lie them across the potting mix. Lynne and Brian took the cuttings home and gave them TLC and they look magnificent today. Thanks were extended to Lynne and Brian. The Committee felt the fairest way to distribute these 12 plants was to write down the members names who were present at the October meeting, which John Clancy has done. At our Auction night next meeting there will be two Thunia plants included, for any member who would like one and was not present at the October meeting. Thunia plants are

Coelogyne Unchained Melody is a primary hybrid between *Coelogyne cristata* and *Coelogyne flaccida*. It blooms in the spring, with pendulous spikes of five to ten white flowers with a slightly yellow to orange lip. There is a light fragrance.

The habitat of *C. cristata* is northeast India, Tibet, Nepal, and into China, at altitudes of up to about 2,500 metres where it experiences moderately warm, wet, summers, and quite cool, drier winters. *C. flaccida* has a similar, somewhat overlapping habitat, extending into Vietnam and Thailand, living at altitudes of about 2,200m. Both species regularly experience winter temperatures below zero. This gives us a hint as to the temperature tolerance of the hybrid *C.* Unchained Melody.

This plant could be grown outdoors in our area, provided that it is somewhat protected from our direct summer sun but will be more than happy in a shade house. Growing orchids, or any plants for that matter, is a cycle. The habitat in which the parent species of *C.* Unchained Melody grow provides for a monsoon-type weather cycle; wet in the summer, and much drier (but not totally dry) in the winter so your culture should reflect that pattern. Water and fertilise well in the growing season and give them a much drier rest in the cold months, withholding fertiliser.

With good culture *C*. Unchained Melody quickly grows into a specimen size plant and is happy to be brought indoors so that you can enjoy the flowers that last for several weeks. It is a great beginner's orchid and should be readily available from orchid vendors or divisions from other club members. Look out for one in our auction.



Thunia Culture

For those members lucky enough to win one of the thunias that were available at the February meeting I have made some notes on their care based on information from various internet sources. At the March meeting another 5 or 6 more thunia plants will be available in a lucky draw for those members who were at the Graham Larkham workshop last year but who missed out last month. Two of the plants have been reserved for the auction and these will be available to any member who chooses to bid for them.

Thunia are deciduous, biennial plants that develop in spring from the previous season's growth which withers and dies during the second season. I believe it is from these old canes that you can propagate new plants in just the same way Graham showed us. Thunias are in peak growing season now so should be kept watered and fertilised to build up a strong cane. One grower uses a water well pot and puts a top dressing of pelleted animal manure on top of the media and also puts some into the water the pot is sitting in. By encouraging strong healthy roots and growth this season you are laying the groundwork for a good flowering sized cane for next year.

When the leaves start to yellow and fall off reduce the watering and stop fertilising completely when the canes are bare. These orchids need a long, cool, dry rest in winter. Just the occasional light watering or misting is all that is needed. Keep these leafless canes in a dry spot over winter to avoid accidental watering. Repot in spring when the new growth appears. After repotting, keep the young shoot/s dry and the root zone just damp. Once the growth/s reach 8-10cm tall and the roots are taking off increase the water and start feeding again. The plants can be watered abundantly during this intensive growth period but excellent drainage is needed so that the media around the roots is never soggy. It is best to keep the water off the leaves if possible.

The thunias grow vigorously through spring and should flower in summer. Some weeks after flowering the leaves will start to yellow and the cycle starts again.

Thunias appear to grow under a variety of conditions but most growers recommend filtered light,

strong air movement, high humidity in summer, a very open medium, plenty of water and fertiliser when growing and, most importantly, that long dry winter rest which is essential for proper growth and flower initiation. I use a red tag in plants that have a dry dormancy but you might put a note on the label just to remind you that the 'stick' is sleeping, not dead!

All plants offered for sale must be disease and pest free, in a good healthy condition and have been repotted for at least 3 months. You are welcome to look over the orchid plants before the auction.

Benching Plants at Monthly Meetings

Monthly meetings can be used as rehearsals for Show benching. Try to ensure that every plant you bench is in 'show condition'; that is, remove dead leaves or trim dead leaf tips, remove bulb sheaths and dead bracts, ensure leaves are clean and the flowers are unobtrusively staked to show them to their best advantage and, most importantly, make sure it is free from pests or disease.
