October Show Benching Marshals' Report

Congratulations to the 22 members who benched plants to make a magnificent, colourful display for our last show of the year. It was especially pleasing to see the number and quality of plants benched by our Novice and Intermediate members.

There were 177 plants benched, beating our spring show total of 171. Well done, and congratulations to all the winners. The competition was very strong and the judges were hard pressed to decide in some classes.

There were only 4 classes with no entries, so it seems our schedule caters well for orchids flowering at this time of year. The new arrangement of the benches and the relocation of the Champions' Table worked well and will be retained for future shows.

Overall, the benching went very well. Just a few reminders:

- When writing the names of orchids on the benching labels please try to use the
 correct script as these labels are used for recording. The genus has a capital
 letter, species is lower case and cultivar name with a capital and in single
 inverted commas, e.g. Cattleya intermedia 'Rex'. *
- Do not forget to put **your** name on the back of the benching cards. The recorders need to know who owns the winner.
- Giving your orchids their best chance of a prize means paying attention to staking early in the development of the raceme. Some of the orchids in the Novice/Intermediate sections were disadvantaged as they were facing down and not displaying their flowers for the judges. *
- Our shows put our orchids on public display so presentation also means ensuring that scruffy or badly marked pots should be cleaned up or doublepotted.
- * These are possible topics for discussion/demonstration at meetings before shows in 2026.

AUSTRALIAN CYMBIDIUMS



There are three species of cymbidium native to Australia. *Cymbidium suave* is the southernmost with its range extending from Bega in NSW all the way up to Cooktown in Queensland.

C. suave is an epiphyte growing in open forest in the hollows of eucalypt trees but can also be found on banksias and other trees. The roots can penetrate deep into the rotted heartwood and the root system is very extensive. They don't make pseudobulbs so they depend on the extensive root system to seek moisture during dry spells. If the tree comes down in a storm the orchid will often continue to grow happily in the stump or on the fallen trunk. The stems have grass-like leaves about 350mm long. The stems continue to grow and new growths tend to 'climb' emerging from the dead leaf bracts at the base of an existing stem. The flower racemes tend to be pendulous and the flowers vary in colour from muddy yellow green to bright apple green. As the name suggests, they are sweetly scented.

Cymbidium madidum is also an epiphyte found in rainforests and swamps but its range is more towards the tropical, high rainfall areas. It grows on trees with rough barks to give the roots purchase. It can also be found on boulders and cliff faces. The pseudobulbs are huge, up to 250mm long and the leaves are also very long – some nearly a metre in length. Having good storage in the pseudobulbs, *C. madidum* can cope with some dry periods and needs a fairly dry rest in winter. As with *C. suave*, the flower colour varies from pale green to darker brownish green. The long, arching racemes may have up to 60 flowers.

Cymbidium canaliculatum extends from the Kimberley in WA, the NT, Queensland and to the Hunter region of NSW. It grows in drier areas west of the Great Dividing Range. In the tropics it can survive the long, dry season as its roots reach deep inside the host tree and it has very tough, fleshy V-shaped leaves which channel any available moisture or dew down to the root zone. The flowers have an amazing array of colours from pale green to dark purple, almost black and some varieties have spots and speckles.



I have grown all three cool in my shadehouse. *C. madidum* is too big for me so I only have a single backbulb left over from when we had to rescue the large plant from the dead banksia. My one plant of *C. canaliculatum* hangs high in the shadehouse under the plastic roof and flowers each year. *C. suave* survives but hasn't flowered for a couple of years. Both *C. suave* and *canaliculatum* have been in the same pots for many years and desperately need repotting.
